Personal pronouns

I	watashi	Used by both males and females.
You	anata	Basic form of the second personal pronoun. Used toward someone unfamiliar. Spoken by women toward their boyfriend or husband.
Не	kare	Basic form of the pronoun meaning "he." However this pronoun is rarely spoken in speech. Last name+san or Fist name+san are commonly used in speech. For example, ikeda san, hanako san, ian san, miren san etc
She	kanojo	Basic form of the pronoun meaning "she." Like kare above, Last name+san or Fist name+san are commonly used in speech.
It	sore	Basic form of the pronoun meaning "it."

Subjective, possessive, objective form

Japanese pronouns have just one form for each. To make a subjective, possessive, or objective form, <u>particles</u> are used
